Grammar explanation

Los condicionales describen el resultado de cierta condición. La cláusula "if" nos da la condición (if you study hard = si tú estudias duro) y la cláusula principal nos dice el resultado (you will pass your exams= pasarás tus exámenes). El orden de las cláusulas no altera el significado.

Si estudias duro, pasarás tus exámenes = pasarás tus exámenes si estudias duro

Present Simple Spelling Rules		
Most verbs takes –s in the third person singular. (He/ She/ It)		
1	- ss, -sh, -ch, -x, -o	-es I miss- he misses I finish- he finishes I watch- he watches I mix- he mixes I go- he goes
2	consonant + y	-ies I study - he studies I cry- he cries
3	MOST OF THE VERBS	-s

(Esta regla es muy importante en el condicional que usa el presente simple)

Zero conditional

If + present simple,	present simple.
50% possibility	100% certainty

We use the zero conditional to talk about things that are generally true, especially for laws and rules.



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Usamos el condicional cero para hablar de cosas que generalmente son ciertas, especialmente leyes y reglas.

- If I drink too much coffee, I can't sleep at night.
- Ice melts if you heat it.
- When the sun goes down, it gets dark.
- If you **heat** water to 100°, it **boils**.
- If you **eat** a lot, you **put on** weight.
- If it **doesn't rain** for a long time, the earth **gets** very dry.
- If we **go out** with friends, we normally **go** to a restaurant.
- If I'm tired, I **go** to bed early.

The structure is: if/when + present simple >> present simple.

First conditional

If + present simple,	will + verb can + verb must + verb imperative form
50% possibility	100% certainty

We use the first conditional when we talk about future situations we believe are real or possible.
Usamos el primer condicional cuando hablamos sobre situaciones en el futuro que creemos reales o posibles.

- If it doesn't rain tomorrow, we'll go to the beach.
- Arsenal will be top of the league if they win.
- When I finish work, I'll call you.
- If you're free later, we **can go** for a walk.
- If they're hungry, I'll **make** some sandwiches.
- If you're **not** back by 5pm, **give** me a ring.
- If he **studies** hard, he'll **do** well in the exam.
- If we **arrive** late, we **must get** a taxi.
- He'll **call** if he **needs** help.
- **Take** a break if you're tired.

In first conditional sentences, the structure is usually: if/when + present simple >> will + infinitive.

It is also common to use this structure with *unless*, *as long as*, *as soon as* or *in case* instead of *if*.

- I'll leave **as soon as** the babysitter arrives.
- I don't want to stay in London **unless** I get a well-paid job.
- I'll give you a key **in case** I'm not at home.
- You can go to the party, **as long as** you're back by midnight.



Second conditional

If + past simple,	would + verb could + verb
0-5% possibility	100% certainty

The second conditional is used to imagine present or future situations that are impossible or unlikely in reality. El segundo condicional se usa para imaginar situaciones presentes o futuras que son imposibles o poco probables en la realidad.

- *If we had a garden, we could have a cat.*
- *If I won a lot of money, I'd buy a big house in the country.*
- *I wouldn't worry if I were you.*
- *If I **had** more time, I'd **exercise** more.* (But I don't have more time so I don't.)
- *If I **were** rich, I'd **spend** all my time travelling.* (But I'm not rich so I can't.)
- *If she **saw** a snake, she'd **be** terrified.*
- *If he **didn't have to** work late, he **could go** out with his girlfriend.*
- *What **would** you **do** if you **were** offered a job in Canada?*
- *You **wouldn't have to** walk everywhere if you **bought** a bike.*

The structure is usually: *if + past simple >> + would + infinitive.*

When *if* is followed by the verb *be*, it is grammatically correct to say *if I were*, *if he were*, *if she were* and *if it were*. However, it is also common to hear these structures with *was*, especially in the *he/she* form.

Cuando "if" es seguido por el verbo *to be*, es gramaticalmente correcto decir "if I were" (recuerda que "I" solo se acompaña de "am") También se podría usar "were" después de *she*, *he* o *it*.

- *If I were you, I wouldn't mention it.*
- *If she was prime minister, she would invest more money in schools.*
- *He would travel more if he was younger.*

A: *I've got a headache.*

B: ***If I were you, I'd** take an aspirin.*

A: *I don't understand this.*

B: ***If I were you, I'd** ask your teacher for help.*

A: *This order won't be delivered on time.*

B: ***If I were you, I'd** phone the customer to let them know.*



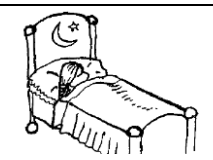
